CT Expert Lectures in Trinidad

Visiting a medical center recently in Port of Spain, Trinidad, Kerry Greene-Donnelly had an eye-opening experience.

"Here I was in a debilitated, circa 1940s hospital – a place which obviously didn't have a lot of resources for infrastructure - yet, I was surrounded by some of the most up-to-date equipment, like a 64-slice Siemens CT scanner," she observed.

Greene was selected by the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO/WHO) and supported by RAD-AID International to lecture on CT and related quality assurance/ testing practices to imaging professionals on the islands of Trinidad and Tobago.

The CHP assistant professor and CT clinical coordinator worked for PAHO/WHO in the past, presenting several webinars from Upstate that were shared with more than 30 countries. The webinars covered CT dosimetry, image quality, CT protocols and pathology. The result led PAHO to ask Greene to lecture in the island country, and on December 6 and 7 about 30 radiologists and technologists attended her talks in Trinidad.

It was more than finding high-tech equipment in a resourcechallenged country that so impressed Greene. The participants were not given credits for attending the lectures and they had to sit in rooms reaching 100 degrees on a weekend. "In other words, they had no incentive other than that they wanted

to learn. It was very inspiring!"

Greene plans to return next year to Trinidad, and to conduct additional imaging webinars this June at Upstate to stream to even more countries served by WHO.

Dean Bonner's Mission is to Help Students in Crisis

We've all heard about someone who had to drop out of college because of a personal or financial crisis. Hugh Bonner has made it his personal mission as dean to help prevent any of his "kids" in the College of Health Professions from leaving their studies due to unexpected misfortune.

"One emergency can make a student leave their program, and they may never come back and finish," said Dr. Bonner. "It's been a passion of mine that if a student is facing a shortterm, financial crisis, I cannot allow it to interfere with his or her education!"

Like the senior whose family home burned to the ground, destroying all the family's belongings. When word of the calamity reached the dean, he saw to it that the student received a \$1,000 gift. The whole department - classmates and faculty alike - also rallied to help and the student was able to complete the program.


Or like the international student subsisting only on apples who received an emergency meal allowance. Or the student with unanticipated medical bills. Over the years and across

all CHP programs, many cases of real, unexpected need have been alleviated with Dr. Bonner's helping hand.

Since the late 1990s, Dr. Bonner has tapped a personally funded reserve to help these students overcome obstacles to becoming healthcare professionals. In recent years the fund has been supplemented by an anonymous donor and matching funds from the Upstate Foundation.

With his retirement approaching, Dr. and Mrs. Bonner and the CHP Alumni Association want to ensure that this type of student assistance continues in perpetuity by creating the Dean Hugh W. and Lynnette Bonner Student Emergency Aid Endowment for Health Professions.

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CLS to Relocate: The Department of Clinical Laboratory Science, comprised of the undergraduate and graduate programs in Medical Technology and the undergraduate program in Medical Biotechnology, will move within Weiskotten Hall from its current location on the second floor to the third floor of the southwest wing. The third floor space will be extensively renovated to provide new student labs and departmental offices and will be designed with input from faculty and students. The goal for occupancy is in the latter part of 2016.


