# White Coat Event Welcomes New Class

Each of the 147 new students in eight degree programs received a new white lab coat – a gift from the Alumni Association – and was greeted on stage by Dean Hugh Bonner, PhD, CHP program chairs and Interim University President Gregory Eastwood, MD.

It's both a welcome and a farewell to this class for Dean Bonner, who announced he will be retiring next year (see story in future edition).

Alumni President Josie Przepiora, MT'00/MS'10, and Joseph Nicoletti, RRT '76, RN, of Franciscan Companies, long time sponsor of the ceremony, also offered remarks. "We believe at Franciscan that the support of future healthcare professionals is essential to the continuance of quality and high-tech healthcare. Our patients deserve it and the healthcare industry demands only the best," commented Nicoletti, director of Corporate Development, Sales and Clinical Services.

## Leader in PT Education to Retire

**Susan Miller, PT, DPT, MS**, chair and associate professor of Physical Therapy Education, has seen and helped lead the way for amazing changes since beginning her teaching career at Upstate 32 years ago.

"I've seen our program go from a bachelor's to master's to the doctorate degree and the class size has grown from 20 to 33. With the completion of the new academic building (in 2016) it will be 40," she noted.

The program earned a 10-year accreditation by CAPTE, "due to a fantastic team of faculty," she said. Serving as program chair since 2006, she was the first on campus to be given the SUNY Chancellor's Excellence in Teaching Award and was an

### "Eyes of Medicine" at Community Campus

Cindy Cress, RT '73, (R,N), CNMT, oversaw transitions in her department that included receipt of an MRI scanner this April at the Upstate University Hospital, Community Campus. The upgrade in hardware and software allows the new MRI service there to include breast imaging, according to Cindy. She has been director of Medical Radiography since 1998, with 31 years total there.

"The staff is very positive about the changes. It is very exciting to see the new programs opening on the Community Campus with the renovations and updates that have occurred," she commented. The entire department conducts about 63,000 exams per year, while about 400 MRIs are performed each month. Since 2011, the

Medical Radiography department has added a new state-of-the-art 128 slice CT scanner and new ultrasound equipment for general, interventional and breast exams.

"The technology is the most interesting part of medical imaging," she added. "We really are the eyes of medicine – imaging helps determine the reason behind people's illnesses or symptoms. It's very gratifying. But I find the most enjoyable aspect of my job is the people I work with and to whom I provide services."

Last year, Cindy was presented the President's Employee Recognition Award for Leader of the Year for the Community Campus for exemplary day-to-day problemsolving, leadership, team building skills and productivity.

# Giant Step in Cancer Care and Clinical Education

The \$74 million state-of-the-art Upstate Cancer Center which opened this summer adjacent to Upstate University Hospital not only infuses the Central New York region with

the most sophisticated cancer care, but also raises student clinical training opportunities to a new level.

"This means access to a worldclass learning environment with equipment that is cutting edge technology," commented Radiation Therapy's clinical education coordinator, **Elton Garvin**, **RADT** '93. "As it is, our program faculty are thankful for all of the clinical sites available to students, including Roswell Park and the University of Rochester, which have already placed our students on the leading

edge of education in the clinical environment. The new Cancer Center is a giant step in the evolution of training students for tomorrow's new discoveries in combating cancer."


The Center houses the region's first VERO Stereotactic Body Radiotherapy System, one of only three nationwide, as well as the only TrueBeam linear accelerator in Central

> New York. The Truebeam offers Gated RapidArc radiotherapy to effectively treat tumors that may move during breathing. These advanced technologies join the already robust offering of cancer imaging and treatment tools available at Upstate University Hospital, including Tomotherapy, Calypso, Gamma Knife Perfexion and the UroNav fusion biopsy system. Other special features at the new Center are 27 infusion chairs. four linear accelerator vaults for

radiation therapy, a high-tech intraoperative suite, a four-season rooftop healing garden, meditation room, family resource center, and more.

### The following CHP faculty members were recognized at the Fall Faculty Convocation.

Carol Recker-Hughes, PT '79, PhD, received the SUNY-wide Chancellor's Award for Excellence in Teaching. Recker-Hughes is highly respected for her skill at facilitating discussion and using active learning techniques, with her research interests centered on the professional



development of clinical instructors and students. She most recently was published in *The Journal of Physical Therapy Education* and received two SUNY grants for innovative instruction and student learning. Recker-Hughes also is a member of the inaugural class of Upstate's Academy of Upstate Educators.

Sandra Banas, BS/MT '77, MST, RPA-C, assistant professor and founding chair of the Physician Assistant Studies program, earned the President's Award for Excellence in Teaching. She joined Upstate in 2008, having been a science teacher, a medical technologist and experienced PA. Banas developed and implemented the PA



Studies program, achieving full accreditation status and

increasing enrollment from eight to 35 students. Banas secured \$3.2 million in federal grants and developed a network of comprehensive clinical sites.

Mary Ellen Dougherty, PT '76, a clinical instructor for Physical Therapy Education, earned the President's Award for Voluntary Faculty Service. Dougherty has been a senior PT since 1989 at St. Camillus Health and Rehabilitation Center in the Brain Injury Unit. She is active in professional development activities at the state and



regional levels and is an active clinical member of the NYNJ Clinical Education Consortium.

Michelle Dolphin, PT, DPT '06, MS, OCS, clinical assistant professor of Physical Therapy, was accepted into the Academy of Upstate Educators as an exceptional educator, facilitator, collaborator and mentor with a passion for her career as an orthopedic PT. She brings "real life" into



her classroom and uses various teaching techniques to accommodate learning.
