First Commencement for the SUNY Upstate Medical Center School of Nursing, graduating seven students with associate in applied science degrees. Founding Director is Maja Anderson.

Joint program begins with Cazenovia College for the AAS in nursing.

Nurse Practitioner Certificate program begins. Dr. Margaret Sovie becomes director, with faculty member Fay Whitney, PhD, as co-director. Dr. Whitney conducts original feasibility study to support development of graduate education for advanced practice nurses.

Maja Anderson retires. Upstate President Richard Schmidt decides to close the School of Nursing with intent to reopen with an upper-division degree program in nursing.

Dr. Fay Whitney becomes Director of Nurse Practitioner Program, holding position until 1983. In May, last class of 76 AAS nursing degree students graduates.

NP Certificate Program closes. In August, first classes for combined BS/MS Program for Clinical Nurse Specialists begin. Co-directors are M. Janice Nelson, EdD, RN, and Judy L. House, MS, ANP.

College of Nursing established with Dr. Nelson as dean.

BS completion program and BS/MS program accredited by National League for Nursing.

Nursing Alumni Association of the College of Nursing is chartered.

Accreditation approved again for maximum 8 years. Dean Nelson retires, and Jorge Grimes, EdD, RN, serves as interim dean.

Elvira Szigeti, PhD, RN, becomes new dean.

Accreditation approved for 10 years (maximum) by the American Association of Colleges of Nursing.

Dr. Szigeti continues as dean and College offers the following programs:

- RN-Bachelor of Science in Nursing
- Master of Science Degree: CNS, PNP, FNP, Family Psychiatric Mental Health NP
- RN-MS Program
- Post-Master's Advanced Certificate Program
- Outreach programs are expanding in Ithaca and Watertown; and the proposed Doctorate in Nursing Practice degree program is undergoing SUNY approval process.

1976 Grad Grows Professionally, Inspired by Program

atherine (Cate) Critz, a Syracuse native who relocated to Hawaii in 2000, found inspirational role models at the College of Nursing and University Hospital early in her career that pushed her professional goals skyward.

"I attended the PNP (certificate) program when Alice Chico taught, and she was a wonderful, inspirational role model. I was working at Upstate in pediatrics at the time when Dr. Frank Oski, chairman of Pediatrics, had encouraged me to attend the program. Truly, graduating from Upstate was a life changing experience from which I moved on to complete my MSN and PhD."

Associate professor at Hawaii Pacific University's College of Nursing and Health Sciences, Critz teaches undergraduate and graduate pediatrics, lifespan development, health assessment and health education. Prior to teaching, she worked as the developmentalist for Kaiser Permanente.

"Teaching had always been a part of my work, but never full-time. After 30 years-plus of clinical pediatrics and developmental pediatrics, I wanted a change. The academic lifestyle with summers off suits my love of travel and the work itself is exceptionally rewarding. And, who can beat surfing before

maintains a small private practice in developmental pediatrics with a focus on learning and autism. "I see children from the different islands and assist their families in obtaining appropriate services. Through the years I have always remained in pediatrics, including

my time at Upstate as a PNP in child neurology, and now as an associate professor in child development."

At the 50th, Critz was impressed with the new Golisano Children's Hospital, particularly having worked in the former pediatric clinic.

Post-Master's Grad Honored for Community Work

aureen O'Hara of Syracuse works for ENHANCE, a program that provides primary health care for foster children in Onondaga County. With ENHANCE since its inception in 1991, she performed primary health

care in her PNP role, and currently does developmental testing on children under the age of two.

O'Hara's career has spanned various areas of health care, including a Navajo Indian Hospital through Project Hope, the inner city in New Orleans, public health in Onondaga County, and in pediatrics at Upstate in both the inpatient setting and ambulatory care.

Regarding her Award for Distinction in Community Service, Dean Elvira Szigeti, PhD, RN, said: "Maureen's nursing career has focused on improving circumstances

for abused and ne-glected children.
She practices at the pediatric and adolescent center at Upstate as both a CNS and an NP.
She coordinates services for

abused children, for those in foster care, teaches the medical and nursing staff, and acts as a consultant and researcher in the area of child development."

"I feel blessed to have had the opportunities to work in different areas of nursing and to have always enjoyed the jobs I've had," commented O'Hara. "It is the patients, families and colleagues I've worked with that have helped me to grow in all these different experiences. To receive this award is an honor and also humbling, as they also deserve a part of this award."

Carol Anne Kozik, MS, CNS, FNP MS Degree, Class of 1996

Nursing Leader/Educator Expert in Informatics

s the informatics coordinator at Cortland Regional Medical Center, Carol Anne Kozik leads projects in clinical systems implementation, including patient care documentation, medication barcoding and scanning, and physician order entry. In this position four years, she's worked in informatics overall for 12.

"I maintain our systems so that they reflect the latest clinical recommendations, build in decision-making tools such as pressure ulcer and vaccine screening, create tools for monitoring care and patient alerts, as well as provide education."

Central to her nursing practice is her role as an educator. She has been teaching at Upstate as an adjunct and a full-time assistant clinical professor for six years. She has taught Community Health, Nurse as Educator, Conceptual Bases for Nursing and Consulting.

Kozik was one of two presenters for the afternoon programs on continuing education during the 50th event. Her topic, "Genomics Game Show," is a result of her initiative developing a game show format to help the review of genomic concepts. Last year, she worked through a National Institutes of Health (NIH) grant on a project to integrate genomics (data involving genes and their relation to human

health conditions) into the baccalaureate curriculum.

"What I hope that participants walked away with (from my presentation) is an awareness of the newest challenges and concepts in nursing curriculum as well as to experience some of the latest technology available for teaching strategies."

Kozik recognizes the importance of a nurse practitioner and clinical nurse specialist in a clinical informatics position because advanced nurses, "bring evidence-based practice to the bedside, improve the safety of patient care, bring disciplines together and serve as a voice for patient care in the technology world."

"I see a great value in the clinical nurse specialist role and teach the terminal course in the Clinical Nurse Specialist program, which focuses on the CNS in the organizational sphere. I see education as a partnership between teacher and student. I love to teach because I learn so much from students as we explore ideas as a learning community. "

"My real passion is in nursing leadership," added Kozik, "or how nurses lead within the organization and transform the profession — a focus in my nursing doctorate studies at Sage College. My particular focus is on empowerment of the student."

"I believe that the faculty at

Upstate is very committed to providing our community with caring, skillful and committed advance practice nurses. I also see a huge commitment on the part of students. Most of our students have jobs and families, yet never miss a class or an assignment and go above and beyond in the clinical settings."

Kozik was recognized at the 50th event with the College's Award for Distinction in Nursing Education. "I'm absolutely delighted!," she said. "There are so many very accomplished alumni that I look up to, I am honored to be a part of them."

Previously, Kozik has been the student's choice for a Distinguished Faculty Award to honor her professional role modeling, student advocacy and excellence in teaching.

"William Butler Yeats said that education is, 'not the filling of a pail, but the lighting of a fire,'" Kozik noted. "I enjoy lighting the fire and seeing students explore their own interests and skills."

Kozik lives in South Onondaga, NY with her husband, Peter, and their five children.

"I chose Upstate for my master's degree because I wanted to learn from faculty who were clinically as well as academically excellent. I was fortunate to work with a number of very skilled nurse practitioners and clinical nurse specialists both in the classroom and at clinical sites. It was a great blend of what we know, what we believe and what we do. I am even more fortunate to be able to teach with some of that faculty now." — Carol Anne Kozik
