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
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CHP Student Tapped for SUNY Chancellor Award


"I knew I had found a perfect fit with Upstate's program," she said.

New Graduate Goes to Paris in Exchange Program

Sarah Goodman, who graduated this May with a BS degree in Medical Biotechnology, is spending June and July in Paris, France – but not on vacation. She is putting her research and laboratory skills to use at a Paris hospital through an exchange program sponsored by the International Federation of Medical Students' Associations.

She spent a good part of her senior year working in the SUNY Microarray Core Facility at Upstate with its scientific director on two research projects related to genetic mutations linked to schizophrenia and Parkinson's disease.

"I've always been interested in genetics and neurodegenerative disorders," Sarah said. "It's like a puzzle, and the mystery is where the pieces should go."

For graduates, one of the Medical Biotechnology

Franciscan Management Endowed Scholarship. "The scholarships have helped me tremendously by allowing me to focus on my studies and, most importantly, helping my patients."

Engaged this summer at the Syracuse VA Hospital, his third clinical experience this year, he wants to work in an ER or ICU following graduation in 2013.

"I absolutely love the program and my instructors," Michael commented.
