PROGRAM EXPANSION EFFORTS FOR 2024

She has worked with local homeless shelters to reestablish relationships that were affected by the pandemic. She has also proposed a complementary model for street medicine to include interdisciplinary teams of practitioners to provide gaps in care to local shelters. Coordination efforts have been moving along, and we look forward to launching our first medical teams this summer!

In the meantime, Olivia has transitioned into her long-awaited MPH student position here at Upstate, and we will patiently await to re-engage with her when she enters her first year of medical school!

LEGACY GIFTS WILL ENSURE THE FUTURE OF HOUSECALLS FOR THE HOMELESS

Upstate Medical University's Housecalls for the Homeless was born in 2018 out of two issues: the standard model of medical care delivery in Onondaga County for its unhoused population was dysfunctional and there seemed to be no solution to this complicated problem.

Working together to address these issues, David Lehmann, MD, and Mia Ruiz-Salvador co-founded the street medicine program to provide much needed attention to a population desperate for care.
Collaborating with the nonprofit In My Father's Kitchen, which was already

providing transportation and other necessities for our sisters and brothers experiencing homelessness in Syracuse, their common vision was realized.

Since its inception, Lehmann and Ruiz-Salvador have worked tirelessly to grow Housecalls for the Homeless. Part of their legacies will be involving medical students in the program, teaching them to provide compassion and dignity in medical care with the hope that the students will carry on the work somewhere, somehow into the future.

The future of Housecalls for the Homeless concerns Lehmann, knowing that one day he will be unable to provide medical care and to instruct students coming behind him. He recognized the need for an endowed fund at the Upstate Foundation, and along with other donors, created an endowment to support Housecalls for the Homeless in perpetuity.

Lehmann and wife, Ann, will be leaving a gift from their estate to grow the endowment.

"We need to grow this endowment so the program can continue; it's the only way it will continue, as the traditional model of medical care will not sustain a physician doing this work," Lehmann explained passionately. "I cannot stress enough the importance of supporting the work of Housecalls for the Homeless through the endowed fund. It will generate income for the program into the future. If we do not have income from this endowment down the road, the program will end."
